

Nike Park is the third largest park in Bucks County. There is so much diversity to witness on this trail such as open water and streams, woods, meadows, and various species. This trail is a great area for birding and even has a bird blind, which educates you on the various species of birds you can find.

As you stroll through the park look out for: bluebirds, redwing blackbirds, woodpeckers, nuthatches, song sparrows, cardinals, gold finches, great blue herons, and red tail hawks.

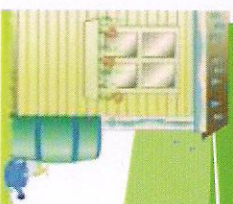
You will also find an abundance of other wildlife such as deer, beavers, squirrels, etc.

On this trail signs will lead and educate you about your environment. You will learn how green infrastructure controls non-point source pollution.

What is Polluted Runoff?

Our rivers, lakes, and streams, became polluted when rain and snowmelt carry harmful substances into them. Human activities are a big part of the problem because of improper disposal and handling of:

- Fertilizers and other lawn care products
- Oils, antifreeze and other vehicle fluids
- Detergents and other household chemicals
- Trash and other debris

What are the Effects of Polluted Runoff?

- Increases drinking water treatment costs
- Causes harm to fish and wildlife
- Limits fishing, swimming, and other outdoor recreational and tourism opportunities
- Diminishes quality of life for local residents
