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# From The Chairman

This phrase from Abraham Lincoln’s Gettysburg Address has become the guiding philosophy of the Board of Supervisors of Warrington Township.

Nearly all of our programs are the results of recommendations from our volunteer citizen committees. These individuals donate their time, energy and often unique expertise gained by applying a combination of education and experience in an attempt to make their Township a better place to live. Board members are elected to represent the interests of the entire community; however, in accordance with Section 1301 of the second-class Township Code, the Board has delegated, subject to recall, “the non-legislative powers and duties” of Township operations to a Township Manager and his professional staff. The Board develops the policies and directs the Manager on what programs to implement.

The majority of new programs start out at the volunteer committee level. Committee members with specific levels of interest and training are sensitive to changes in their areas of expertise and their potential impact on the Township. They review these issues and make recommendations to address the needs of the Township today. Many of the Committees were formed over twenty years ago and their goals and mission statements may not agree with the needs of today. As a result, every one of the “Standing” committees has been asked to update its mission statement (if necessary), confirm its membership and establish a set of short and long-term goals.

All committee meetings are open to the public, and the public is always invited to participate. Since the Covid-19 pandemic, the majority are held in a hybrid manner, so residents do not even have to leave their homes to attend a meeting. Many of our residents are busy with both work and family, so the hybrid model allows more flexibility and we encourage residents to participate to the best of their ability.

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# TOGETHER AGAIN - PSATS Resounding Success!

This year's PSATS conference, held April 24th to April 27th at the Hershey Lodge in Hershey, PA, was a resounding success with approximately 3,500 representatives from municipalities all over the state coming together to learn from each other and ask important questions on behalf of their residents.

Our Board of Supervisors, Township Manager and Board Secretary attended multiple sessions and exhibits to enhance their knowledge base about issues important to the state and our Township.

## OTHER HAPPENINGS AT THE CONFERENCE

Ms. Eileen Albillar, Vice Chair of the Warrington Board of Supervisors, and Board Delegate, voted upon the Resolutions presented at the conference.

Indoor and Outdoor Exhibits were exciting and informative as they varied from copiers and cyber security to tractors and paving equipment.

This year, PSATS held a Legislative Grassroots Reception where Supervisors could meet elected state senators and representatives. They also held a Together Again Welcome Back reception and Dessert with Dave, an opportunity to interact with Executive Director, Dave Sanko.

Sessions included Planning and Zoning such as "Effective Enforcement of Code and Zoning Violations", "Managing the Unimaginable: Cloudbursts & Catastrophic Floods", as well as Public Safety, Public Works, and Administration sessions, including "Let's Chat: Effective Social Media Strategies" and "Right to Know Law Update" and "Small Grants, BIG Recreation Impact."

Overall, the Board of Supervisors and Township Manager came away with new ideas for implementing programs at the municipal level, as well as improvements to communication and social media. They also learned about the nuances of how to better manage police negotiations and arbitration and to prepare for the management of future stormwater and flooding events.

## Ensuring Transparency

Fred R. Gaines, Chair of the Warrington Board of Supervisors, presented one of the seminars titled "Ensuring Transparency for Township Governments: A Proven Response to the Amended Pennsylvania Sunshine Act Right-to-Know Law, Act 65 of 2021". This presentation spoke to the critical issue of dialogue early and in public with our citizens about any project, including discussion at the early stages, establishing an ongoing line of communication and then hearing from residents.

The process is based upon:

- Formation of Volunteer Standing Committees and Ad-Hoc Committees
- Assignment of Supervisor Liaisons to All Committees
- Use of social media to augment Township Website
- Commitment of residents to address issues from start to finish.

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# JOIN EAC TO INVESTIGATE HEALTH OF WARRINGTON STREAMS—LOCAL PROJECT

If you use any of the Warrington parks or trails, please consider joining the EAC group of volunteer stream monitors. This program is designed to foster knowledge and awareness of the tiny miracles along and in our local waterways. The Open Space and Land Preservation Committee (OSLP) and Environmental Advisory Council (EAC) are pleased to initiate this STEM project. The goal is join a Penn State initiative that raises awareness about the health of our waterways. Participation requires approximately 2-3 hours a year. Using a questionnaire, participants will examine water clarity, stream bottoms and life, nearby vegetation and wildlife use. This is a great project for all who appreciate the outdoors (children welcome!) (See Penn State Webinar) (<https://extension.psu.edu/the-conewago-creek-initiative-a-model-for-watershed-engagement>)

Participants will sample stream water, examine stream bottom life, note evidence of wildlife and nearby vegetation. Children and youth are welcome.

Observations will be recorded in a survey on the health of our watershed ( F.I.S.H. Survey) (<https://fishprotocol.org>). Volunteers who want to continue with the project will be encouraged to return to a personally selected stream collection area twice during the year in spring and fall. ## KEEP YARD WASTE OUT OF OUR STREAMS



**Keep our Streams Clean!** Dumping of yard clippings, leaves and other debris along streams or drainage channels can cause flooding, impede the flow in the stream or create stagnant areas in the stream that could lead to mosquito problems.

### Ways that yard waste can impair the stream

- Yard waste like leaves, grass, and brush piled along stream edges suffocates and kills the trees and shrubs that are critical for avoiding stream bank erosion.
- Yard waste piled along streams can easily be washed into streams during large rain events.
- Once in the water, yard, garden and pet waste releases nutrients which promote over-growth of algae and other nuisance aquatic plants.
- Chemicals previously applied to yards, gardens, and trees can be released into the water.

### How can you help?

- Sweep yard waste (grass clippings, leaves, etc.) and fertilizers off driveways, sidewalks and roads.
- Do not put yard waste next to a drainage ditch or stream channel.
- Take yard waste to the Warrington Township Leaf and Yard Waste Disposal site or compost the waste at a site away from the waterway.
- Apply fertilizer and lawn chemicals sparingly and according to directions.
- Never dump anything down storm drains, in gutters, streets, ditches, or other areas that drain into a storm sewer or body of water.
- Use a mulching lawn mower for grass and leaves

# RENTAL INSPECTIONS UNDERWAY

On March 16th, rental inspections began! This was approximately four weeks ahead of schedule after the Board of Supervisors approved the new Rental Inspection Program.

Matthew Cruz, the new Rental Inspector, comes to the Township with just the right temperament not only to be a rental inspector, but a rental inspector for a new program. Matt understands that this is a new program and not everyone is in favor. He has adopted the mindset that working with people is a better approach than making demands.

After completing his onboarding program, Cruz started learning about the Township and shadowed several inspectors to learn different ways to conduct inspections.

In particular, he shadowed Gary Toth and Chris Bergen, the Township's Residential and Commercial Building Inspectors, conducting construction inspections, so he could learn about building construction. He shadowed Curtis Diehl and Lee Greenberg, with the Township's Code Enforcement team, to learn how to conduct occupancy inspections.

Cruz provided feedback from those shadowing experiences, which was extremely beneficial in preparation to starting his own inspections. Cruz says of the experience, "I learned a lot in a short amount of time with each inspector and appreciate the time each one took with me to begin this program effectively and efficiently."

At the time of this writing, there have been 60 inspections. These inspections have been beneficial not only to the Township, but also the residents. For example, Cruz discovered a bathroom constructed in a basement without permits, many safety items, such as: smoke detectors without batteries, carbon monoxide detectors missing or were never present, GFCI outlets that were not present within 6 feet of a water source, and a few instances of extensive clutter within a residence.

Greenberg notes that, "While the program is new, most residents have been welcoming to Inspector Cruz, and appreciate the program and have offered comments of support."

While it is too early to determine the future of this program and program changes that will need to be made, the Township is monitoring the program and a full report will be presented to the Board of Supervisors at the end of the year.



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# Energy Saving Tips and Tricks for the Summer

Aside from being just annoying, these hot summer days can also be a disaster for your wallet. By far, the largest part of your energy bill comes from your home's heating and cooling system. With your AC running 24/7 all summer long, you can expect some of your highest electric bills of the year to come between June and September. Fortunately, you don't have to boil in the summer heat just to save a few bucks. By following these simple summer energy-saving tips, you can keep the temperature, and your budget, well within the comfort zone.

- 1 Check Your Air Conditioning** - Your air conditioner requires regular maintenance to function efficiently throughout its years of service. Neglecting necessary maintenance ensures poor performance and unnecessarily high energy use. Checking the coils, fins, evaporative cooler, and heat pump may require the services of a professional.
- 2 Use Fans With Your A/C** - Running a fan is much cheaper than running your air conditioning. In fact, running a fan 24/7 for an entire month would only cost about 5 dollars on your electricity bill. Unfortunately, fans don't actually produce cold air—they just move the existing air around. The air flow creates a wind chill effect that helps people feel more comfortable, but it does nothing to change the temperature. However, fans and air conditioning work very well together. If you use air conditioning, a ceiling fan will allow you to set your thermostat setting about 4°F higher with no reduction in comfort. Remember to turn your fans off when you leave the house. With no people around to feel the wind chill effect, the fans aren't doing much except making your energy bill slightly higher.
- 3 Use Your Thermostat Wisely** - Set your thermostat as high as comfortably possible in the summer, ideally 78°F or higher. Every degree of extra cooling will increase energy usage six to eight percent. Keep your house warmer than normal when your family is away at school and work, and lower the temperature only when people are at home. Avoid lowering the thermostat while air conditioning is running. It won't cool your house any faster and may result in energy waste. A smart thermostat can make these temperature transitions easy. Smart thermostats are Wi-Fi enabled devices that automatically adjust the temperature settings in your home for peak energy efficiency.

Smart thermostats learn your habits and preferences and establish a schedule that automatically adjusts to energy-saving temperatures when you are asleep or away.

- 4 Replace Your Air Filter** - Replacing your air filter is one of the easiest and most effective things you can do to make sure that your A/C runs smoothly and efficiently. Clogged, dirty filters block normal airflow and reduce your air conditioner's ability to absorb heat. Replacing a dirty filter with a clean one can lower your A/C's energy usage by up to 15%.
- 5 Close Your Blinds** - Close your blinds or drapes in the daytime to keep out the greenhouse effect of the sun. Southern- and western-facing walls take the brunt of the sun's heat, so invest in good drapes or shades for the windows on these walls and keep them closed. North-facing windows admit relatively even, natural light, producing little glare and almost no unwanted summer heat gain. You can leave these shades open to admit natural light into your house without heating things up.
- 6 Avoid the Oven** - Cooking with a conventional oven can add unwanted heat to your house, forcing your A/C to work harder. Do more of your cooking with a microwave or slow cooker to keep the kitchen cool. Better yet, use the summer heat as an excuse to fire up the old backyard barbecue. Outdoor grilling is a summertime tradition for a reason—you can cook delicious meats and veggies while keeping the heat outside.

### SAVE ON YOUR ENERGY BILL ALL YEAR LONG

Energy savings isn't just a summertime activity. Many of these tips will save you money all year long. Air stripping, insulated curtains, and intelligent thermostat usage will keep your home cool in the summer and warm in the winter. Creating smart energy habits will reduce waste, improve efficiency, and save you money on your energy bill year-round.

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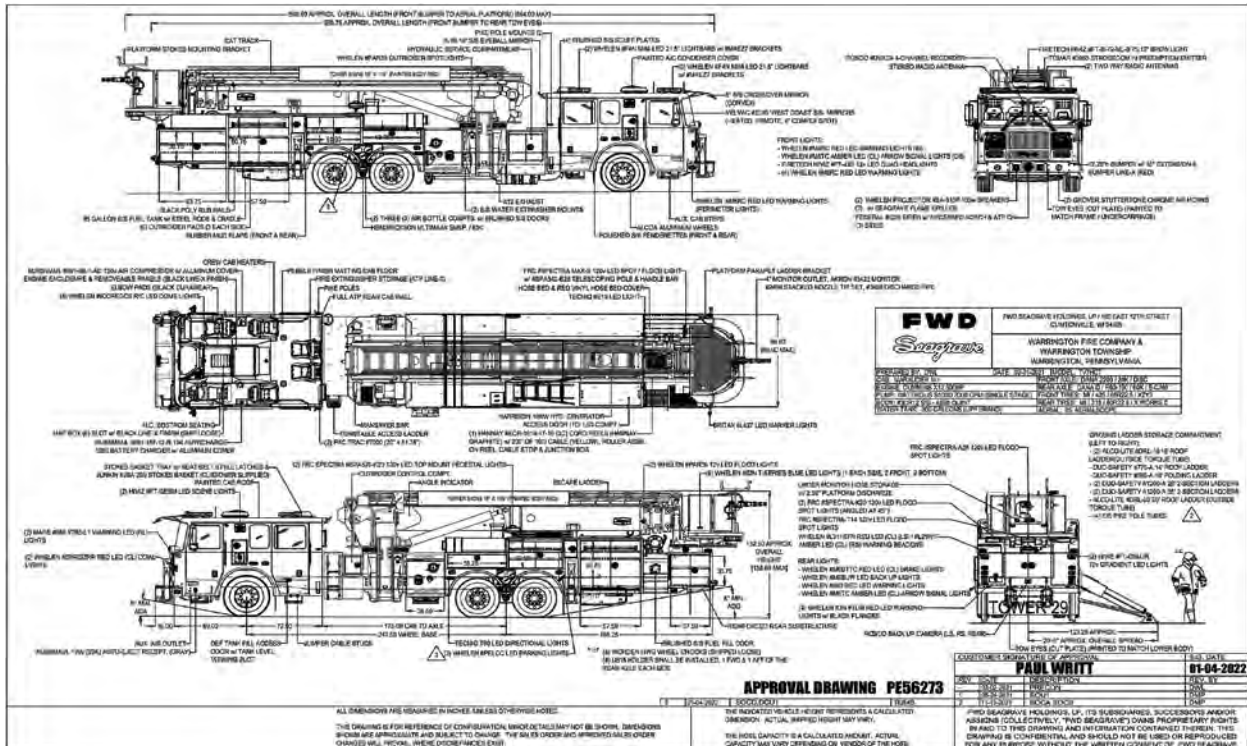
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# New Aerial Ladder Truck Arrives This Summer!

The Warrington Township Department of Emergency Services and the Warrington Fire Company are eagerly awaiting the arrival of their new 2022 Aerial Ladder truck. The apparatus will be delivered in mid-summer. This new apparatus will serve the residents of Warrington Township by providing a 95-foot extension arm with an aerial bucket on the end, in addition to carrying a multitude of different sized ground ladders, 300 gallons of water, and a 2000-gallon-per-minute water pump. The apparatus was ordered from Seagrave Fire Apparatus in Wisconsin and custom build for Warrington. The apparatus was ordered in January, 2021.

The truck replaces a 2004 E-One rear-mounted ladder. That apparatus served Warrington well for 18 years, but changes in technology and the way new homes, and nursing homes are being constructed made this the right time to upgrade a major piece of equipment. Tower-Ladder 29 will be on display around Warrington after it is delivered.

## LESSONS ON PERMITS

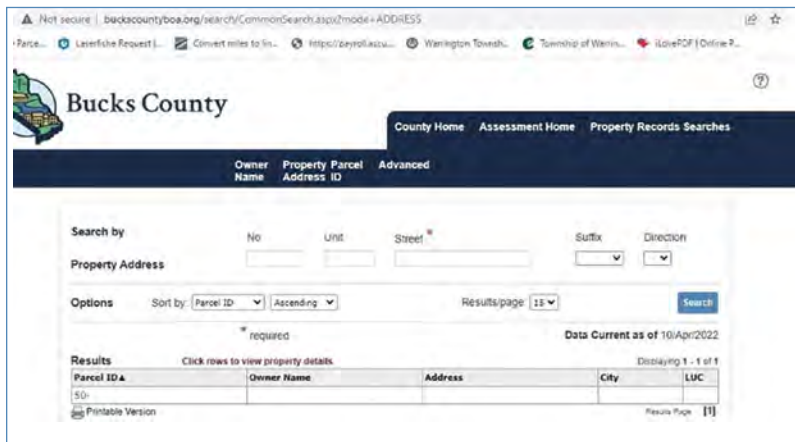
So now that we have covered impervious surfaces in the last issue and why it is so important to manage stormwater and flooding, what comes next? Let's talk more about the permitting process.

Permits help municipalities keep track of lots of things; for Zoning it could mean impervious coverage, grading and drainage, how far things are from property lines, what types of buildings can be on properties, what types of uses can take place, to name a few. For Building, covered under the **Uniform Construction Code of the Commonwealth**, it means keeping an eye on how things are built so that the materials and methods used result in safe structures in which to work and live. Many of these codes conform to national standards set by the **International Code Council**.

Warrington Township, like most municipalities in the Commonwealth, have Zoning and Building Permits. Each designs a permit application on which residents supply information about their properties and the projects they would like to complete. Typically, there are two to three components, depending upon the project. Zoning, which is about land use, a plot plan that shows the location and size of the project and at times, building, which includes the plans and manufacturer's information used to construct and install the project.

### Parcels – How to Find Out More

Before delving into the application form itself, let's look at several resources available to all residents to aid in finding information about their parcels. From zoning districts and parcel numbers to floodplains and simple lot boundaries, Bucks County hosts two websites in which a resident can find a wealth of information. **The Bucks County Board of Assessment website** is where you can find information on subdivision names and lot numbers, as well as the parcel number. **The Bucks County GIS – the Parcel and Floodplain Viewer** hosts a ton of information from locating your zoning district, floodplain (FEMA) information, as well as showing basic lot lines of parcels.



On **The Bucks County Board of Assessment website**, locate the **Parcel Records Search** page, enter the property address, and click on the address in the **Results** line to access your records.



Next, look to the left of the record screen and locate **Full Legal** to find the subdivision in which the property is located if there is one, and the lot number and put that on the form. **Sketch** will give you the basic square footage of all the building impervious coverage which includes your house, garage, and major outbuildings (not sheds).

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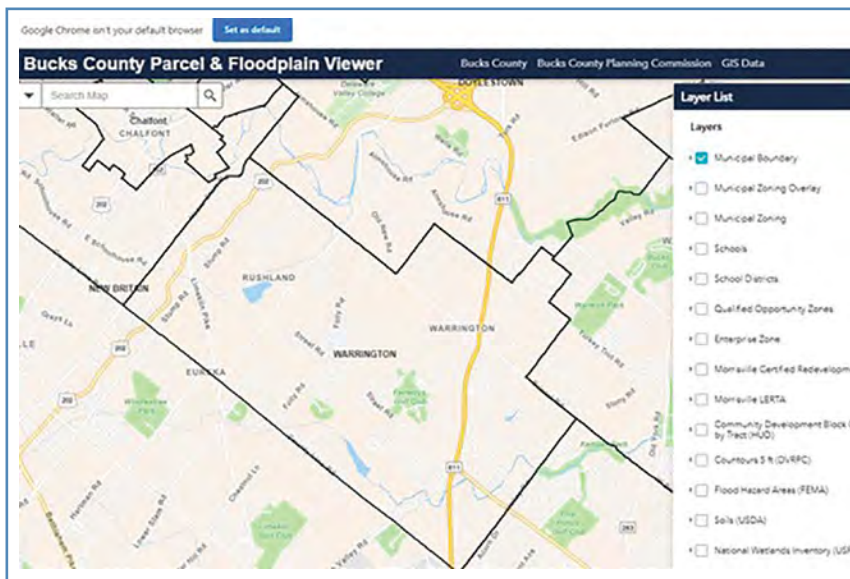
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## LESSONS ON PERMITS *continued*

**On The Bucks County GIS – the Parcel and Floodplain Viewer**, type in either the parcel number that you located on Board of Assessment's website, or the property address and your parcel will be identified to include showing basic parcel lines. Only a survey provides an accurate representation of the actual parcel. Surveys are a wonderful way of knowing exactly where your property lines are located, and any licensed surveyor can provide that service.

The **Layer List** on the right provides information about the Zoning District, the overlay districts, FEMA information, and as you can see, a host of all sorts of information about your parcel.

While much of Warrington Township is not in a floodplain, floodplain data is used to determine what types of projects will be permitted and whether or not Federal FEMA mandates for building apply.



### Permit Application – Let's Get Started

So where are we with our permit application? Just at item **1. Property Information!** Taking the time to locate this information and providing it at the time of the application submission greatly assists the Zoning Office with the review of the application. As you can see, there is much involved with just identifying the property before the review process even begins.

Page 1 of the **Application for Zoning and Building Permit** contains other information necessary for issuing a permit.

- **Box 2. Owner information.** This is where the owner supplies the information about the parcel they own and include all the necessary contact information in legible writing. Daytime phone numbers and email addresses assist all departments in contacting the owner should there be questions about the application.
- **Box 3. Contractor Information.** Our Township requires that the contractor doing the work is properly registered with the Township and carries adequate liability insurance. Their PA license number is required in addition to a complete address and contact information.
- **Box 4. Building Permit Application.** Tell us about your project! Is it an addition, a garage, an interior remodel, new heating or air conditioning, a deck, a patio, a fence, etc.? A complete description of the project on the first page helps our officers to identify the ordinances and codes that will apply to the project. It helps us determine if we need to look up information from past parcel files. Is the project a replacement, a repair, a new structure, has new impervious coverage?

As you can see, much goes into the preliminary review of the information supplied at the time of the application submission.

Next time, Permits Part 2. We will walk through the permit application form in more detail and help you understand how to fill out the remainder of the form. Zoning and Building can be difficult to understand at times. Our offices: Zoning, Permit Administration and Building all work together to issue permits that accurately reflect your projects and help keep the legal parcel records current. So, stay tuned and we look forward to continuing to assist you with your projects and zoning and building questions.

According to Avail and Realtor.com Housing Forecast, 2022 is expected to bring "new profitability and challenges to the rental market" as residents continue to choose renting over purchasing a home. 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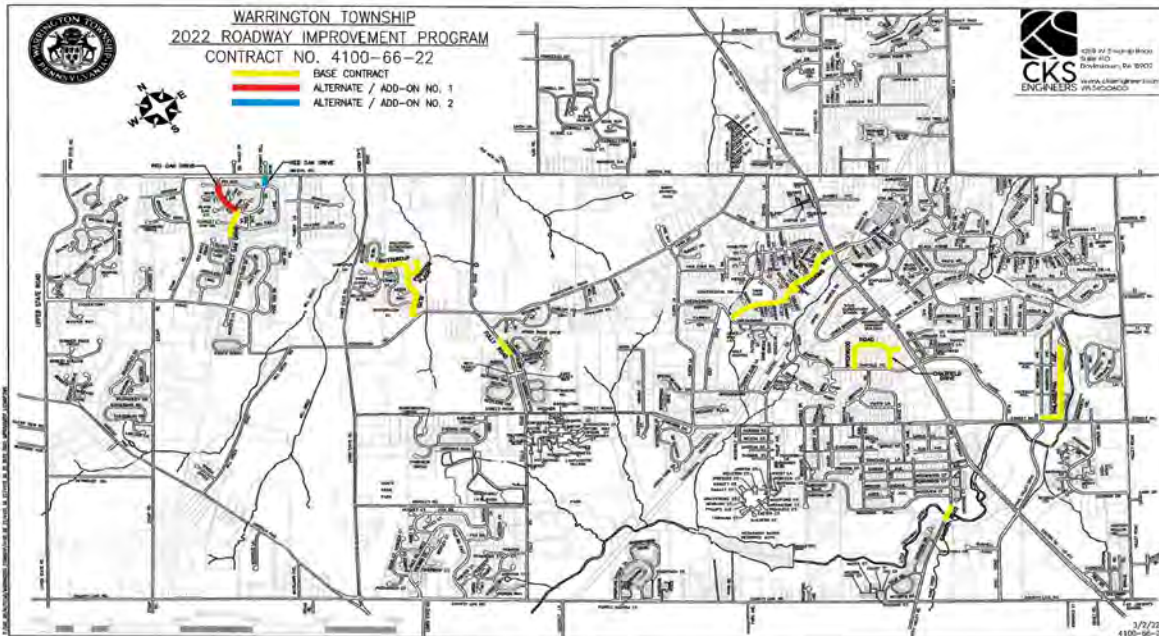
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# 2022 ROADWAY PAVING IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

The Township has released the 2022 Roadway Paving Improvement Project for bids. This year's project will include pavement repairs and repaving of Philadelphia Avenue, Freedoms Way (Easton Road to Greensward North), Scarlet Oak Drive (Red Oak Drive to Township Open Space), Buttercup Boulevard (Pickertown Road to Bellflower Boulevard), Primrose Place, Chatfield Drive and Wyckwood Road, as well as portions of Folly Road and Kansas Road. Also potentially included is the repair and repaving of sections of Red Oak Drive, which may be included as part of this year's Project dependent upon the bid pricing that is received by the Township. Each year the Township allocates over \$1,000,000 towards its annual paving program for the purpose of maintaining Township owned roads in good condition.

Bids for this year's Roadway Improvement Project are scheduled to be received by the Township in mid-April, and it is expected that the Board of Supervisors will award a contract for the paving work in early May. It is anticipated that the initial preparatory work such as concrete curbing, ADA Ramp upgrades and pavement base repairs will begin in early June, with final paving of the roads in mid-late August. There will be some temporary lane restrictions that will be established during the upcoming paving work, and so we request your patience and understanding as we work to maintain our Township roads for all our residents and visitors.

### **Farmer's Market 2022 – What to Expect**

In 2022, there will still be a generous mix of local crafters, but Warrington Farmer's Market (WFM) is upping its food game. In addition to the local farmers and food vendors that it already has, it is adding an additional 10 vendors in the "FOODIES" category. Last year, there was everything from Honey farmers, a local bakery that employs individuals with special needs, mushroom guy to beef jerky. This year it will be adding a fudge maker, a bread guy, a jams and jellies guy to a popcorn family . . . just to name a few.

Every week there are over 30 vendors, food trucks and live music. The season will start Friday, June 10th and run till mid-October. If there is bad weather, notice will be posted on the WFM Facebook page that day. The "doors" open at 4 and close at 7. The WFM does not allow any early birds in before 4pm, to give the vendors plenty of time to set up, as most come from full time jobs and do this as a side business.

So, please join the WFM on Friday, June 10th from 4-7 for OPENING NIGHT. That night there will be a little something extra for the kids. Every week is very family friendly, but that first night WFM is teaming up with a local company and doing an on-site FOAM PARTY. Check the WFM Facebook page for more details starting in May. Tickets must be purchased for the foam event ahead of time and 40% of those sales will go directly to Lions Pride Park. The WFM is a non-profit event. Mariah Derinth McCormick, Market Manager, and her team coordinate and manage all of this for free, so that every cent of the vendor fees goes directly to Lions Pride Park (which is right across Folly Rd from the market).

### **Weekly at the Farmer's Market**

- Fundraising tent-this tent is for the local nonprofits and/or kid's sports teams, to raise money for their needs.
- Musician playing each night - the very talented, Rodney, happens to be a Warrington resident
- 30-40 local small business owners selling their goods - from bakeries to farmers, wood workers to cut flowers

### **The Farmer's Market Story – How it all Began**

It all started on a zoom call. The Lions Pride Park committee was trying to come up with creative ways to raise money for the playground. Many ideas were bounced around and one of the members mentioned a food truck event. They all agreed for Mariah to look into it and see what she could come up with. Well, fast forward three whole weeks and it was opening night. Yep, you read that right, three weeks.

Other farmers markets were visited, market managers were interviewed, and vendors were invited.



Opening night was such a success that traffic pulling into the farmers market required enlisting the help of the local Warrington police to direct traffic. The general feedback was that people were so thankful for this type of event to come together in their community not only for the things they could purchase, but also for the chance to be a part of a large gathering in the midst of what seemed like a never-ending pandemic. Families came, couples came, people brought their dogs and friends came to have a "moms' night out" together. The WFM as a weekly community gathering throughout the summer that reminded us that we needed each other and served as a place that local and home-made businesses could sell their wares.

## County Line Road Closure Update

You've most likely experienced the detour related to PennDOT's transportation improvement project to repair and improve 3-miles of County Line Road between Kulp Road and Route 611 in Horsham and Warrington Townships.

### Project Includes Stone Bridge.

Overall, this project includes the following improvements listed below.

But, it also entails repairing the stone-arch bridge by reinforcing the arch and wing walls with concrete, and by replacing stones, resetting dislocated stones, and applying new mortar.

According to PennDOT's website, this bridge was built in 1890 and reconstructed in 1962. It is structurally deficient. It is 15 feet long and 26 feet wide. The structure carries 14,169 vehicles a day. The bridge will be posted with a 10-ton weight limit when it reopens to traffic.



This PennDOT project includes the following improvements:

- Widening County Line Road to provide a uniform pattern of two 11-foot travel lanes and five-foot shoulders;
- Replacing the County Line Road bridge over an unnamed tributary to Little Neshaminy Creek;
- Upgrading traffic signals;
- Installing a new guide rail;
- Performing drainage improvements;
- Installing ADA curb ramps; and
- Performing other miscellaneous operations to enhance safety and travel for the motoring public.



### Detour information:

- County Line Road through traffic will be directed to use Lower State Road, Street Road, and Route 611 (Easton Road).
- Please follow the designated detour route, and do NOT drive around 'Road Closed' signs or barricades.
- Please be respectful of your neighbors and do NOT drive through neighborhoods to avoid the closure.
