

Background



In 2012, the citizens of Warrington Township passed an Open Space Referendum, authorizing the Board of Supervisors to borrow up to 3 million dollars over 20 years, to purchase and protect open space. This commitment demonstrated a clear demand for protecting as much of the remaining open space and natural areas left in Warrington Township as possible.

Priorities


1. Evaluate and choose the most valuable parcels for purchase.

2. Leverage referendum monies to the maximum

extent.

3. Choose suitable locations for Open Space signage.

4. Review development plans for consistency and compliance with Open Space Ordinances.




Identified Uses of Referendum Money

- Finance, acquire, and improve open space by purchasing undeveloped land and farmland.
- 2. Improve the trail system by acquiring trail linkages and expanding the trails system.
- 3. Improve infrastructure in existing parks.
- 4. Acquire and preserve historic lands.

Top Priority Parcel-Mill Creek Property was purchased in December 2018



Natural Lands prepared a Resource Management Plan summarizing the current state of natural resources within the Mill Creek property. This report documented management options for protecting and enhancing this newly acquired parcel, which will be a passive park in Warrington Township.



An Environmental Assessment was prepared by Boucher & James, Inc. as a requirement of receiving

Land and Water Conservation Fund monies.


Many Beautiful Meadows and Open Spaces

Trails-A grant was submitted through the DVRPC Regional Trails Program in 2018. The grant was awarded and the trail will be constructed in Township Open Space.



Lions Pride Park and Pond to Wetland Grant

- A grant was submitted to the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources to convert the existing degraded pond at Lions Pride Park, into an educational wetland. The grant is entitled "Ecological Restoration of Natural Habitat".
- The proposed park will emphasize outdoor nature play and environmental education. This park will be a multigenerational facility were everyone can enjoy open space and nature.



Continued Efforts by Committee

- Collaborate with other Township committees.
- Maintain citizen oversight of open space bond budget.
- Give input on external grants submitted for Township Open Space initiatives.
- Educate residents at Township events.
- Develop strategies for partnerships to maximize open space.
- Incorporate Green Infrastructure initiatives into open space plans.
- Encourage maximum open space to be integrated into development plans by working with the Planning Commission on the Conservation Residential Development Ordinance.
- Develop a Master Plan for existing open space in the western part of the Township, including the 66 acres.
- Choose locations for new Open Space signs.
